PRIMM SPRINGS, Tenn.—Over the Labor Day weekend, instead of enjoying the last days of summer with family and friends, Democrats and other Trump-deranged folk had nothing better to do than indulge in sick fantasies about the president's death.

Hashtags like #trumpisdead and #whereistrump trended on X, with countless TikToks, Google searches and posts saying "TRUMP DIED" garnering millions of likes and views.

This was not a harmless meme or politics as usual. It was seeded by anonymous left-wing social media accounts and amplified by journalists and influencers to create a permission structure to fantasize about Trump's demise.

Despite photos of Trump golfing with his grandchildren and his numerous long missives on Truth Social—including about the landscapers who ruined the new limestone paving in the Rose Garden—the rumor went viral.

Politifact traced the rumor's origin to a tweet from a virulently anti-Trump "foreign policy" reporter named Laura Rozen, from Al-Monitor, who shared a screenshot of the White House presidential schedule and faux-innocently noted that Trump hadn't been seen in two whole days!

Her post was viewed 34 million times and gave rise to countless copycats who dreamed up a White House cover-up and all manner of ailments that might have felled the president.

Hearing of own 'death'

"How did you find out over the weekend that you were dead?" Fox News reporter Peter Doocy. asked Trump at an Oval Office press conference Tuesday.

"1.3 million user engagements as of Saturday morning about your demise."

In the style of Mark Twain, who once famously said, "Reports of my death have been greatly exaggerated," Trump made light of the rumor, and dismissed it as "fake news."

He pointed out that he had a "very active" weekend.

"Last week I did numerous news conferences . . . and then I didn't do any for two days, and they said, 'There must be something wrong with him.' Biden wouldn't do them for months. You wouldn't see him. And nobody ever said there was ever anything wrong with him."

Exactly.

Joe Biden was AWOL—almost his entire presidency and on the few occasions he was encountered by the press, he alternately whispered, yelled, fell over or shuffled about like a cadaver. Yet all the same people who turned a blind eye to Biden's infirmities and routinely castigated the rest of us—"He's sharp as a tack! Stop being ageist! Cheap Fakes!"—are now questioning Trump's health.

In a 2,000-word piece written by three reporters Tuesday, *The New York Times* revisited the bruises on Trump's hand that they keep pretending are sinister but just come from vigorous handshaking with large numbers of people, something Biden was never at risk of doing.

"His ankles are swollen. He is the oldest person to be elected president," they wrote, while acknowledging a "wishful-thinking industry around Trump's health [and] legal woes."

At 79, the president demonstrates an enormous capacity for vigorous action, morning, noon and night. What drives his opponents mad is they can't keep up.

That's why the entire Democratic Party apparatus is keyed in to the elimination of Trump.

No answer to victories

He has shown them up badly, and they have no answer to his victories, whether on illegal migration, big-city crime, cutting taxes, ending wars, boosting the economy, kicking biological boys out of girls' sports, canceling vaccine mandates, Making America Healthy Again and all the other common-sense prescriptions he is energetically putting into place.

They can't seem to counter him or change course and have no leader other than a snake oil salesman named Gavin with slicked-back hair and bizarre hand gestures who tries unsuccessfully to imitate Trump.

So they have retreated into the delusion that, if only Trump were gone, all their problems would vanish.

Their constant framing of Trump as "Hitler," an "authoritarian fascist" and an "existential threat" who must be stopped at all costs, fosters a climate in which death threats against the president are normalized.

This week, Washington, D.C., grand juries let off two nutjobs charged with repeatedly threatening to assassinate the president.

One was a New York woman who posted on Facebook that she wanted to "sacrificially kill this POTUS by disemboweling him and cutting out his trachea" and was arrested by the Secret Service at a "No Fascist Takeover of DC" rally outside the White House.

After Trump survived two assassination attempts during the 2024 election campaign, liberal feeds lit up with regret.

One third of Democratic voters surveyed by a British politics professor in a small snap poll published in UnHerd in July 2024 agreed with the statement, "I wish Trump's assassin hadn't missed."

Former FBI Director James Comey typified the casual malice when he posted an Instagram photo of seashells that spelled out the numbers "8647," which he captioned: "Cool shell formation on my beach walk."

The number 86 is a slang term meaning "to get rid of" or "kill," and Trump is the 47th president.

So Comey's message was a pretty clear incitement to violence, for which he was investigated by the Secret Service and the Department of Homeland Security.

Of course, he pretended he had no idea what the numbers meant: "I didn't realize some folks associate those numbers with violence."

As if a guy with decades in law enforcement, who rose to the top of an intelligence agency that specializes in national security threats, wasn't adept at interpreting coded assassination threats.

Trump knew better: "That meant assassination, and it says it loud and clear. Now, he wasn't very competent, but he was competent enough to know what that meant."

Chi-town incitement

Then there is Chicago Mayor Brandon Johnson, who has no solution to the violence that claimed eight lives in his city over the weekend.

On Monday at a protest rally, he bordered on inciting violence against federal troops whom Trump has threatened to send in to clean up crime.

"Are you prepared to defend this land that was built by slaves?" he shouted.

"Are you prepared to defend this land?"

Earlier he told MSNBC: "The people of this city are accustomed to rising up against tyranny and, if that's necessary, I believe the people of Chicago will stand firm."

Rise up or stand firm.

The message is clear.

Violence is encouraged, or at least condoned, by Democrats with nothing to offer, just as it was in 2020 when luminaries from Kamala Harris to Minnesota first lady Gwen "I want to smell burning tires" Walz welcomed the mayhem of the George Floyd anti-cop riots.

This is not normal.

A collapsing political party is as dangerous as an animal in its death throes.

PRIMM SPRINGS, Tenn.—We are suffering through an epidemic of leftist violence.

The ruthless assassination of conservative youth leader Charlie Kirk, 31, at a crowded campus event in Utah on Wednesday is the latest manifestation of the hateful rhetoric aimed at President Trump and his MAGA movement.

It's a sad irony that Kirk's shockingly public murder happened the day before the trial begins of Ryan Routh, one of the alleged assassins who tried to rub out Trump during the 2024 campaign.

Prescient as always, Kirk understood the consequences of the escalating violent rhetoric of the left, as he and Trump kept winning the hearts and minds of a new generation, especially young men, with logic and common sense.

"Assassination culture is spreading on the left," he tweeted two months ago. "Forty-eight percent of liberals say it would be at least somewhat justified to murder Elon Musk. Fifty-five percent said the same about Donald Trump."

In California, activists are naming ballot measures after alleged CEO-killer Luigi Mangione.

"The left is being whipped into a violent frenzy. Any setback, whether losing an election or losing a court case, justifies a maximally violent response."

Contrary to the narrative pushed by left-wing media and fanned by President Joe Biden and his administration, the political violence is almost exclusively from the left.

Dem encouragement

Setting the scene were the deadly BLM-Antifa riots that engulfed the country in the summer of 2020, which were tacitly encouraged by Democrats like Kamala Harris and Tim Walz as a way to destabilize then-President Trump and then project their own culpability and motivations onto the J6 Capitol riot by Trump supporters one afternoon.

Then, of course, Trump was the target of two assassination attempts last year, including almost having his head blown off, but miraculously tilting it at the right moment for the bullet to nick his ear instead.

There was also the arson and vandalism against Tesla dealerships to intimidate Elon Musk and punish him for his support for Trump.

A few months ago, Israeli Embassy staffers Yaron Lischinsky and fiancée Sarah Lynn Milgrim were assassinated, allegedly by a Palestinian activist, outside the Capital Jewish Museum in Washington, D.C.

United Healthcare CEO Brian Thompson was assassinated in December 2024, allegedly by a wealthy leftist spouting left-wing critiques of corporate greed and health-care inequities.

There was the assassination attempt against Supreme Court Justice Brett Kavanaugh at his Maryland home by a deranged abortion activist, and of course the leftist who shot up Republicans at a congressional baseball practice in Virginia in 2017.

Even the arson attack on the home of Pennsylvania's Democratic Gov. Josh Shapiro, which pundits like Jake Tapper try to cite as an example of bipartisan targets, was perpetrated by a left-wing, pro-Hamas, anti-Israel activist.

Charlie Kirk's answer was civil discourse. Contrary to the lies spread by MSNBC and CNN on the day of his death, he was not "a divisive figure" and he did not engage in "hate speech."

He reached across the aisle and engaged young people respectfully in dialogue. He was never personal or nasty. He was courteous and civilized. He was kind and patient.

He would tour universities under the banner "Prove Me Wrong," encouraging students to challenge him with any question. He put forward his views calmly and with a smile—capitalism is better than socialism, there are only two sexes—and was happy and courageous enough to debate anybody in good faith.

That's why he won hearts and minds on campuses and galvanized a generation. It's what made him such a potent political force, helping Trump win in 2024.

It's why his political opponents had to lie that he was hateful and divisive. It's precisely because he was neither of those things that young people listened to him.

Plainspoken truth

He was not afraid to be plainspoken. He didn't sugarcoat uncomfortable facts. He told the ugly truths that America tries to bury.

A protective father and husband, he was particularly exercised by the random stabbing murder of 23-year-old Ukrainian refugee Iryna Zarutska on a light-rail car in Charlotte, N.C.

In one of his last tweets, he wrote: "If we want things to change, it's 100% necessary to politicize the senseless murder of Iryna Zarutska because it was politics that allowed a savage monster with 14 priors to be free on the streets to kill her."

"This was one of the . . . coldest, most senseless murders I've ever seen," he said in an interview. "This whole criminal-justice reform stuff has been a complete failure."

He knew that the lies the Democrats and the media told about George Floyd's death in 2020 are what got Zarutska killed.

The lies are what drove disastrous criminal-sjustice reforms, like cashless bail and emptying prisons, that were predicated on systemic racism, a nonexistent problem designed to drive a wedge between black and white Americans.

Kirk called out that rancid, divisive lie for what it is. He held up a mirror to Democrats and made them see themselves as they are: the party of projection, accusing others of what's in their own hearts.

When Rep. Lauren Boebert (R-Colo.) proposed a prayer for Kirk on the House floor Wednesday afternoon, a dozen Democrats reportedly protested.

You could hear them shout "No!" and "Pass some gun laws!"

"America will never be the same," Kirk wrote Tuesday night in his final tweet about Zarutska.

It was accompanied by a photo of the young woman, just after she was stabbed, wide-eyed, terrified, in shock as she looked around at her killer, hand to her mouth, knees pulled up in the fetal position, before she slumped to the floor and bled out.

Kirk wasn't to know that, 12 hours and 35 minutes after he wrote those words, he would join her in death.

No, America will never be the same.

But Kirk's death, like his life's work, is a turning point.

Look at what he accomplished in 31 years.

Imagine what he might have gone on to do. In his short life, he formed a future generation of leaders who see the world as he did, clearly, logically, with reason tempered by compassion, and with faith in Jesus Christ.

In death, he may yet accomplish more than he already has. His mode was to be strong, brave and resolute. Live your values. Get married, have children, make the world a better place, with courage and grace for your fellow man.

That's his legacy, and it's up to all Americans of goodwill to take up his mission.
