Comment in early ministry

Notice how the Son of God used that phrase early in His ministry.

- John 2:18-19—When the Jews asked for a sign, the Son of God responded: "Destroy this temple, and in three days I will raise it up."
- John 2:20—The Jews responded: "It has taken 46 years to build this temple, and will you raise it up in three days?"
- John 2:21—But the Son of God was talking about His body being the temple.
- John 2:22—When the disciples remembered this comment later on, they understood what the Son of God meant.

Taunted later

Years later, some people threw those words back into the face of the Son of God.

- 57-58.
- 29-30.

Sign of Jonah

- Matthew 12:39—The Son of God acknowledged the sign of Jonah.
- Matthew 12:40—As Jonah was three days and three nights in the belly of the great fish, the Son of God was to be three days and three nights in the "heart" of the earth.

Warned His disciples

Toward the end of His ministry, the Son of God foretold His disciples about four upcoming events-He would go to Jerusalem. He would suffer, He would die, and to you when He was still in Galilee, saying He would be raised on the third day.

- Matthew 16:21—"Be raised the third dav"
- Matthew 17:23—"The third day He will be raised up."
- Matthew 20:18-19—"The third day He will rise again."
 - Mark 8:31—"After three days rise again."
 - Mark 9:31—"He will rise the third day."
- Mark 10:33-34—"And the third day He will rise again."

- Luke 9:22—"Be raised the third day."
- Luke 18:32-33—"And the third day He will rise again."

Guarding the tomb

Pilate took the threat of the Son of God rising after three days so seriously that He guarded the tomb.

- Matthew 27:62-63—The chief priests and Pharisees warned Pilate about what the Son of God said when He was alive: "After three days. I will rise."
- Matthew 27:64—The chief priests and Pharisees suggested that Pilate make the tomb secure until the third day—so that the disciples wouldn't steal the body.
- Matthew 27:65-66—Pilate ordered that the tomb be secure.

Two preparation days?

Understanding the preparation day (before an annual Sabbath and a weekly Sabbath) is critical to understanding the his-■ See Matthew 26:60-61 and Mark 14: toric scenario about the resurrection.

- John 19:31—Many Bible students iden-■ See Matthew 27:39-40 and Mark 15: tify this preparation day as a preparation day before an annual Sabbath—("for that Sabbath was a high day").
 - Luke 23:54—Many Bible students identify this preparation day as the same one mentioned in John 19:31—a preparation day before an annual Sabbath.
 - Luke 23:56—Those same Bible students identify this Sabbath (which is mentioned a few verses later) as a weekly Sabbath, shortly after the annual Sabbath.

Comments after the empty tomb

Here are three comments made after the disciples found the empty tomb.

- Luke 24:6-7—"Remember how He spoke 'The Son of Man must be delivered into the hands of sinful men, and be crucified, and the third day rise again."
- Luke 24:21—Two men traveling toward Emmaus said: "Besides all this, today is the third day since these things happened."
- Luke 24:46—The Son of God reminded the disciples: "Thus it is written, and thus it was necessary for the Christ to suffer and to rise from the dead the third day."
