Rarely has a foreign country seemed so eager to get bombed by the United States as Iran does right now.

In its latest provocation, Iran seized a British-flagged tanker in the Strait of Hormuz on Friday. It wasn't a subtle operation. Revolutionary Guard forces rappelled onto the tanker from a helicopter, and if you have any doubt, it was all captured on videotape.

The act raised the stakes in the regime's confrontation with the West. After the last round, when the Iranians shot down a U.S. drone, President Trump ordered a retaliatory strike that he abruptly cancelled, citing his fears of disproportionate casualties.

Our natural instinct would be to hit Iran hard for its depredations and to establish a deterrent against such attacks before they get worse. But in this case, Iran clearly wants to provoke a reaction, which suggests the administration's more cautious, "rope-a-dope" approach may be the right one.

Skeptics doubted that the administration's unilateral sanctions could truly bite after the nuclear deal opened Iran for business with Europe. They were wrong.

The oil embargo and banking sanctions, imposed after Trump pulled out of the deal, have been cratering the Iranian economy. The regime's aggressions are an attempt to find a way out of the economic punishment.

The mullahs hope to exploit daylight between the Europeans and the United States (although poking the British won't advance that goal) and to send a message to the White House that its pressure campaign doesn't come without costs. Tehran also has begun breaching nuclear limits imposed under the Iran deal, another front in an effort to spook the West into rallying around the Iran deal and convincing Trump to relent.

What to do now? The administration should obviously render whatever assistance the British may request. It should continue to send more forces into the region as a message of resolve, and to work with allies to better secure shipping in the Strait. It should ratchet up the pressure campaign against Tehran, and revoke the remaining waivers that allow the Europeans to cooperate with Iran's purportedly peaceful nuclear program.

It is quite possible that Iran considers its provocations a prelude to another nuclear negotiation.

For his part, Trump continues to dangle the prospects of talks, even blessing diplomatic outreach by Senator Rand Paul. But the regime has a strong incentive to try to wait Trump out and hope the election of a pro-deal Democrat delivers what it wants without any more trouble.

Perhaps the Iranians believe that Trump getting embroiled in a conflict advances that goal. Regardless, they obviously want to escape from the box that they are in, and Trump shouldn't let them.

A Kuwaiti newspaper created a stir earlier this month when it reported that Israel's new F-35 stealth fighters had flown over Iran.

(Note: This first appeared in April of last year.)

"The fighters crossed Syrian airspace into Iraqi airspace, including to Iran, where they carried out reconnaissance missions and targets in the areas of Bandar Abbas, Isfahan and Shiraz, flying at a high altitude over other sites suspected of a relationship with Iran's nuclear program," according to an "informed source" quoted by the newspaper Al-Jarida (Google Arabic translation here).

The F-35s were allegedly not detected either by Iran or Russian radar based in Syria, according to the article.

So did the incident really happen?

First, if the incident were true, that would mean that operational missions are already being flown by the F-35I Adir ("Mighty"), the Israeli version of the Lockheed Martin fighter. Israel currently has only nine of them, and the first squadron was declared operational only late last year. The Israeli Air Force (IAF) has a well-earned reputation for boldness, but there is a difference between being bold and foolhardy. IAF pilots and planners have barely had time to acclimate to a fifth-generation aircraft different from the fourth-generation F-15s and F-16s they currently operate. Even the U.S. military is struggling to fix numerous bugs in the F-35.

The baseline F-35A has a combat radius of around 600 miles (external fuel tanks add range but compromise stealth). The direct route from Tel Aviv to Tehran, which would overfly Jordan and Iraq, is about a thousand miles. The F-35I includes several unique modifications, including special external fuel tanks being developed by Israel. Yet even with air-to-air refueling, for which the IAF has a limited tanker capability, reaching Iran would still be a taxing flight on a par with the risky 1981 raid on Iraq's Osirak reactor.

Not to mention Iran has its own air defenses, including Russian-made S-300 long-range anti-aircraft missiles. Israel's enemies rejoiced when the IAF lost an F-16 to Syrian anti-aircraft missiles in February. Imagine the propaganda coup if Iran shot down an F-35.

Besides the technical risks, there is a bigger question: why fly the mission at all?

Tensions are high, and predictions of war nigh, between Israel versus Iran and its Hezbollah proxy. But unless Israel believed war was truly imminent, and the F-35 was the only platform that could gain reconnaissance information (never mind Israel's spy satellites and drones), then the only reason to do it would be to send Iran a message.

But neither Iran nor Israel has claimed any overflights. So who is the "informed source" that made that claim? Saudi Arabia, which is embroiled in a Persian Gulf cold war with Iran and would love Tel Aviv to fight Tehran? Other Gulf states? The CIA?

Adding to the rumor stew is an Arab news site that claimed the Israeli jets flew from Azerbaijan, which borders Iran but buys weapons from Israel. Which in turn assumes that Israel is basing stealth jets in a Central Asian state that happens to border Russia.

And speaking of Russia, what's also interesting is the reaction to the incident by the Russians, who have radar in Syria that allegedly can detect stealth aircraft. Not surprisingly, Russia's *Sputnik News* quickly ran a story in which the Russian Ministry of Defense angrily denied the incident. "The information published in a number of mass media outlets with reference to a foreign source, that 'Israeli fighters deceived the Russian radars in Syria and conducted reconnaissance at a high altitude' is a total stupidity," an unnamed source told the media site.

When Alabama Gov. Kay Ivey, a Republican, signed into law in May one of the nation's most restrictive abortion bans, she invoked her faith.

"To the bill's many supporters, this legislation stands as a powerful testament to Alabamians' deeply held belief that every life is precious and that every life is a sacred gift from God," Ivey said in a statement.

This is a familiar trope for the Republican Party when it comes to abortion access. In January, Kirk Cox, speaker of the Virginia House of Delegates, cited Biblical scripture when he came out against a proposed bill that would lift late-term abortion restrictions.

"You knit me together in my mother's womb," he said, quoting Psalm 139. "You watched me as I was being formed in utter seclusion as I was woven together in the dark of the womb. You saw me before I was born."

But for many leaders in the Jewish faith, such interpretations are problematic and even insulting.

"It makes me apoplectic," said Dayna Ruttenberg, a Chicago-based rabbi who's written about Jews' interpretation of abortion. "Most of the proof texts that they're bringing in for this are ridiculous. They're using my sacred text to justify taking away my rights in a way that is just so calculated and craven."

Across the country, as a wave of anti-abortion legislation reinvigorates the fight over reproductive rights, Jewish rabbis, activists and women are speaking out in favor of a women's right to choose, buoyed by their faith.

It's not just that the U.S. shouldn't be deriving law from poetic language, Ruttenberg said. It's that the Jewish tradition has a distinctly different reading of the same texts. While conservative Christians use the Bible to argue a fetus represents a human life, making abortion murder, Jews don't believe that fetuses have souls and therefore, terminating a pregnancy is no crime.

While some Orthodox rabbis have denounced abortion, within Jewish communities there's considerable support for keeping it legal.

Studies from the Pew Research Center show that Jews overwhelmingly (83 percent) support abortion rights. The National Counsel on Jewish Women, a 126-year-old organization that helped establish some of the first birth control clinics across the country, considers reproductive rights a cornerstone issue, and has publicly condemned the strict abortion bans recently handed down in Alabama and Mississippi.

Republicans have been pushing for decades to overturn Roe vs. Wade and now, with two Supreme Court appointments from President Donald Trump giving the court a conservative bent, the law seems more at risk than ever before. Restrictive laws are being passed all over the South, and, according to the Guttmacher Institute, which tracks abortion legislation, 30 states currently "demonstrate hostility toward abortion rights," while only 14 demonstrate support.

It's common in this debate to hear the Christian perspective. But what's often left out of the conversation is how Jews, who read the Hebrew Bible—referred to in Christian circles as the "Old Testament"—argue that their tradition condones abortion. Sometimes, if the mother's life is at stake, it even insists on it.

"This is a big deal for us," Ruttenberg said. "We're very clear about a woman's right to choose. And we're very clear about the separation between church and state."

U.S. Rep. Debbie Wasserman Schultz, D-Fla., likes to joke that she took tikkun olam so seriously, she wound up in politics.

Within the Jewish tradition, tikkun olam—Hebrew for "repair the world"—is a sort of call to action, a concept defined by acts of kindness and service that help heal the world. For Wasserman Schultz, the first Jewish woman to represent Florida in Congress, her faith informs her politics every day.

"I have always served and looked at policy through a distinctly Jewish lens," Wasserman Schultz said. "And so for me, when I'm thinking about a woman's right to make her own reproductive choices, the Jewish tradition that I've always been taught holds that existing life should take precedence over potential life, and a woman's life and her pain should take precedence over a fetus."

The strongest argument in the Hebrew Bible for permitting abortion comes from Exodus, chapter 21, verse 22-23: "If people are fighting and hit a pregnant woman and she gives birth prematurely but there is no serious injury, the offender must be fined whatever the woman's husband demands and the court allows. But if there is serious injury, you are to take a life for a life."

In this passage, "gives birth prematurely" could mean the woman miscarries, and the fetus dies. Because there's no expectation that the person who caused the miscarriage is liable for murder, Jewish scholars argue this proves a fetus is not considered a separate person or soul.

The Talmud, a Jewish text comprised of centuries worth of thought, debate and discussion, is also helpful when discussing abortion. The Talmud explains that for the first 40 days of a woman's pregnancy, the fetus is considered "mere fluid" and considered part of the mother until birth. The baby is considered a nefesh—Hebrew for "soul" or "spirit"—once its head has emerged, and not before.

Jewish tradition and scholars have also acknowledged a pregnant woman's potential "great need" to terminate a pregnancy.

Rabbi Elizer Waldenberg, a leading authority on Jewish law who died in 2006, wrote in Tzitz Eliezer, his major text, that "it is clear that in Jewish law an Israelite is not liable to capital punishment for feticide . . . An Israelite woman was permitted to undergo a therapeutic abortion, even though her life was not at stake . . . This permissive ruling applies even when there is no direct threat to the life of the mother, but merely a need to save her from great pain, which falls within the rubric of 'great need.' "

"There's a lot of ambiguity about what that need means," Ruttenberg said. "A psychological need is considered real."

Wasserman Schultz referenced pikuach nefesh, the principle in Jewish law that the preservation of a human life overrides nearly all other religious considerations, which also allows a woman to seek an abortion, especially if her own life is in danger.

"You can use that same principle to show that women, more than anyone else, understand their bodies and what medical decisions are right for them," Wasserman Schultz said.

For Wasserman Schultz, abortion access should be unrestricted, regardless of faith. "I'm not gonna tell you that you're interpreting scripture incorrectly," she said. "But don't prescribe rules for me and my decisions based on your interpretation of your scripture."

The move to overturn Roe v. Wade: La. latest to pass an abortion ban. Here's where other key states stand.

Retired U.S. Sen. Barbara Boxer was one of the most prominent Jewish law-makers in the country while she represented the state of California for 24 years. There's no doubt, Boxer says, that faith informs each individual's personal views on a variety of subjects. But that's exactly what they are—personal views, not something for everyone else to comment, or legislate, on.

"If you respect religion, then you should be pro-choice," Boxer says. "We can't always agree 100 percent with each other, but we can respect each other . . . and I feel I am respecting religion by saying I would fight for your rights regardless of what you believe."

To Rabbi Michael Adam Latz of Minneapolis, the fight over abortion rights—and lawmakers who reference their faith as a reason for why certain laws should exist—is a larger issue. This shouldn't just worry Jews, whose tradition teaches something other than Evangelical Christianity, he says. It should worry anyone who believes in religious freedom.

"While I certainly understand that there are people who disagree with me, in a nation for which religious pluralism is a hallmark, to impose one religious tradition on this is not actually how a democracy functions, it's how a theocracy functions," Latz says. Every person of conscious, he says, regardless of their personal views on abortion, should be deeply concerned.
